The UUA—Fitting our Principles with Our Practice

The Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations (UUA) was given birth in 1961 with the consolidation of Unitarians and Universalists. In these past 56 years (and for much earlier through each of these roots) we have espoused a set of principles that honor, in their current phrasing: “The inherent worth and dignity of every person” and “Justice, equity and compassion in human relations.” These are noble values and not always easy to uphold. Throughout this half-century there have been times when some have questioned our commitment to these principles. This year is no exception.

For instance, to date all UUA presidents have been male and ministers. We have broken the mold somewhat with the two most recent presidents in having an African-American, Bill Sinkford, and a Hispanic, Peter Morales. Barring an unusual set of events, we will have our first female president later this year, since all three of the candidates for this position are female. All three are also ministers so that criterion is still implicitly in place. Each congregation is entitled to vote for their candidate of choice. I encourage everyone to take time to look at the biographical information for each of these individuals. It is available through the UUA website and here: <https://www.uuworld.org/topics/uua-elections>. The candidates will be speaking at the UUA Regional Assembly in Woburn, MA later this month. I will be attending this session. Another of our UU principles is this: “The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large.” Let’s be sure we exercise that right.

Leadership in other positions continues to be a challenge. For instance, 9 of the 11 senior-level positions at the UUA are currently held by white men. The two persons of color are Taquiena Boston, who is the Director of Multicultural Growth and Witness, and President Morales,

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who term expires this June. The presidential candidates are all white. In our five regional offices all leads (senior staff members) are white and ministers. The recent hiring of a white, male minister to replace the outgoing lead for our Southern Region has sparked a strong response from members of the UU community. A strongly worded letter, signed by 121 ministers and religious educators, exemplifies the passion felt by many as we grapple with the challenge of living our principles.

The UUA has a history of support for anti-racism/anti-oppression/multiculturalism. The most recent action is a pledge by the UUA Board of Trustees to contribute \$5.3 million to the Black Lives of Unitarian Universalism (BLUU) organizing collective. Funding will come from a variety of sources. The Northern New England District, which includes NH, VT, and ME, will be asking its members to support a pledge of \$300,000 to this initiative at its annual meeting following the Regional Assembly.

Building a diverse and inclusive community has been an ongoing goal of Unitarian Universalism. These examples indicate current activities in our Association. The question remains: Are we meeting this goal?
