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
Oyster River Folk: Upcoming Concerts



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RE Program Update: How to get involved!

The RE Committee is gearing up for the 2013/2014 year. With the retirement of our dedicated leader, Thomas Pistole, we are re-examining the needs of the program. We have an excellent group of teachers lined up for instruction of our Elementary and Middle School groups on Sunday mornings. This year, we are in need of support from other members of the Fellowship in two ways:

- 1. We need volunteers for the childcare room on Sunday mornings. At this point in time, there is only one child enrolled in the childcare program, but there may be occasional drop-in families in need of care. Hannah Legard, who has provided wonderful childcare support for many years, is moving on.
- 2. We need volunteers to serve as "floaters" for the RE program. The floater has no specific teaching responsibilities but may provide support to a given classroom, if needed. The primary purpose of the floater is to ensure child safety by not having children in class alone with one adult. Thomas has served this role for many years and we now need the support of the entire Fellowship.

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General Assembly 2013

Once a year—although there is talk about making them biennial—several thousand UUs from around the country and beyond gather to conduct the business of our association. This is the 52nd anniversary of the consolidation of Unitarians and Universalists, so it was the 52nd General Assembly. This year the meeting was held in Louisville, KY.

I attended my first GA in 1996 and have participated in most of them since. I am grateful to the Fellowship for allowing me to serve as a delegate to this assembly and for providing support to attend. GA for me is always an exciting time and this year was no exception. In this column I would like to give you one person's perspective of GA. In future columns I will focus on some of the specific aspects of this program.

After arriving at the hotel and getting settled into my room, I headed for registration. I had already registered for the GA so at that registration table I picked up my packet of materials. Next I stopped at the delegate booth. I turned in the form signed by Bob Pavlik indicating that I was a DUUF delegate. In turn, I received a voting card, a delegate room to attach to my nametag, and the official business program for the next four days. Finally I signed up for the GA Choir. I then headed off for our first rehearsal. In the evening I attended the New England Regional Gathering, along with folks from the four districts that comprise this region. The evening ended with the famous banner parade and the opening plenary session.

On Thursday I attended to morning worship followed by plenary. Plenary sessions are the business meetings. All can attend but only official delegates can vote. Following another choir rehearsal and lunch, I went to a workshop entitled "Lifelong Learning and Beyond," in which three religious educators presented information about lifelong learning networks. Quoting Maria Harris, a well-known and respected professor of religious education, "the congregational experience is the curriculum." More on this later. On to another plenary session, then an evening mixer for folks associated with the religious education and the music credentialing programs. It was great to connect with many colleagues and to meet some of the folks in the music program. Finally I attended a forum for the candidates for the position of UUA Moderator.

Friday was a heavy business meeting day, both morning and afternoon. At breakfast and lunch I met with colleagues associated with the LREDA [Liberal Religious Educators Association] Committee on Mentoring, for which this year I serve I chair. In the evening I attended the Ware Lecture, given by Eboo Patel. He is the founder and president of Interfaith Youth Core and he was excellent!

Saturday was another heavy business meeting day. I also attended a networking session for people interested and/or involved in adult religious education. It was good to see how many people this attracted. On several occasions we had to search for additional chairs to accommodate everyone. In the afternoon I attended a workshop that shared some of the highlights of the UU initiative Gathered Here, a program that invited people from all aspects of our faith community to share their thoughts on what gives life to our faith. It was eye-opening.

Sunday included the Morning Worship, at which the GA Choir sang, following by another marathon business meeting day. GA concluded with a Closing Ceremony, which also included the GA Choir.

Some years ago I made the commitment that, whenever possible, I would take an extra day either before or after business trips to see the city. I was able to see quite a bit of Louisville and environs in that day.

General Assembly is an amazing experience. I hope others will consider attending and serving as our Fellowship's delegate (we are entitled to two!). Next year it will be held in Providence, RI. Single day registrations are available. Please do not hesitate to ask me more about GA.

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Final Financial Report of the Operating Fund Through June 30th of Fiscal Year 2012-13:

Thanks to an upsurge in donations over the last 6 weeks of the fiscal year plus higher rental / use of house income in addition to lower than expected expenditures across almost all accounts, I am extremely pleased to report the following:

- There is an operating surplus of \$1,150.71 for the twelve-month period through June 30th in Fiscal Year 2012-13.
- This result was significantly better than the budgeted \$8,700 deficit.
- Operating Fund Balance is \$8,922.01.
- Operating Fund Cash Balance is \$30,517.39 as \$21,595.38 from other DUUF Funds are deposited in the same bank account.

Fund Balances as of June 30th of Fiscal Year 2012-13:

- Operating Fund Balance is \$8,922.01.
- The remaining four (4) other active Fund Balances total \$31,595.38, bringing the total of all Fund Balances including the Operating Fund to \$40,517.39.
- \$10,000 from the Nest Egg Fund is on loan to the New Hampshire Community Loan Fund.
- The remaining cash for all five (5) Fellowship Funds totaling \$30,517.39 is being held in the Operating Fund's Advantage Checking Account, earning interest at the rate of ~.10% per annum.
